Section 2 - Needs Assessment Executive Summary:

The comprehensive needs assessment that was done by the district addressed the following areas: 1) student achievement; 2) teacher/administrator quality; and 3) school climate (parent involvement, safe and healthy schools, etc.). For each of these areas, a plan of action has been determined for improvement. Information gained from the school/district report cards, assessment results, questionnaires, surveys was utilized to develop this strategic plan. Strengths, weaknesses, and areas that need improving were determined from this information. Strategies and activities were then developed.

Student achievement data has been analyzed over time with emphasis on ACT Aspire and now the 2016 SC READY test data. According to this data, each school has various subgroups that need immediate attention. The most common areas are socioeconomic, disability, in English language arts, mathematics, and racial/ethnic. There has been a drop in scores across the district due to a new assessment over the last three years. There was also a drop in science at grades 4 and 7. In social studies there was a drop at grades 4, 7, and 8. The district must be sure that the curriculum and what is actually being taught more than adequately covers the state's academic standards (SC College- and Career-ready Standards). In addition, the district must be sure that the students in grades Pre-K-2 are being prepared for grade 3. Additional 4K classrooms needed in all the elementary schools across the district in order to have more students coming to the first grade ready and to serve our school population. Continuing to try to reduce class size, particularly at the elementary school level, was identified as a major need for student achievement to improve.

It is imperative that students be prepared now for ACT and ACT WorkKeys. According to the data, the ACT Composite Score for the district was 16.5 where the State was 18.2. The ACT WorkKeys data showed 85.2% of the students received a NCRC Certificated where the State had 86.8%. More students need to meet scholarship requirements and make a score of 3 or better on Advanced Placement classes. The dropout rate of 2.1% did decrease from 3.4% the year before. Districts with students like ours have a dropout rate of 2.5% while the median district in the state has a dropout rate of 2.3%. Another concern was graduation rate for African Americans.

Secondly, teacher/administrator quality is being addressed. According to Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), teachers must be properly certified by the end of the 2017-18 school year. Presently 92.89% of the district's core academic subject area teachers are properly certified. All teachers must meet the requirements to be technology proficient during their next renewal certification cycle. In addition, there are 33 teachers, guidance counselors, media specialists, and administrators who are presently participating in the Teacher and Employee Retention Incentive (TERI) program and will have to be replaced in the near future. There are also 17 retired teachers, guidance counselors, media specialists, and administrators employed. By federal requirements, paraprofessionals must also be highly qualified and presently 100% of the paraprofessionals in the district meet the requirement. Quality professional development opportunities must be provided so the teachers meet the properly certified requirement by the beginning of the 2017-18 school year.

Thirdly, school climate is being addressed in this strategic plan. Data indicated that there still is a need to improve in the area of parent/guardian participation and involvement. Strategies and activities are in place to improve performance. School facilities have been identified as a need that must be addressed through the areas of maintenance and housekeeping.
