In Lake View, major renovations were begun at Lake View Elementary School and Lake View High School. At Lake View Elementary School. classrooms were painted, replaced, flooring updated, dropped, and a new fire alarm system installed. In the school's main office, new carpeting was installed, walls painted, and a area renovated reception parent/student check-in. Construction was also begun on a new cafeteria. At Lake View High School, renovations to the cafeteria were begun and an addition to the dining hall was constructed to add seating for staff and students.

2014 SAT Test Results

The Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is an entrance exam used by colleges and universities to make admission decisions. SAT scores provide colleges with one common criterion that can be used to compare all applicants. However, it is just one factor in the admissions decision. Colleges and universities also consider students' grade point averages (GPAs) from high school, academic transcripts, interviews, personal essays, and letters of recommendation.

2014 EOCEP Test Results

The End-of-Course Examination Program (EOCEP) is a statewide assessment administered to South Carolina students. The Education Accountability Act of 1998 (EAA) requires the administration of end-of-course examinations in gateway courses awarded units of credit in English, mathematics, science and social studies. EOCEP tests items are aligned to the South Carolina Academic Standards for each content area. Student scores count as 20% of each student's final grade in the tested subjects.

- · East Elementary was recognized as a Title I Reward School for academic performance under the SC ESEA/Federal Accountability System.
- East Elementary formed a community partnership with Zaxby's to recognize students with the highest scores and most growth between MAP testing sessions.
- South Elementary School received a grant from Wal-Mart for school beautification.
- Students at South Elementary School received clothing to start the school year at a "Back-to-School Giveaway".
- Students at Stewart Heights Elementary School were recognized for exhibiting good behavior and positive character traits at quarterly "Kids with Character" breakfasts.
- · Mini notebook computers were purchased for student use at Stewart Heights Elementary to increase the number of computers available in each classroom.
- · Lake View Elementary was recognized as a Title I Reward School for academic performance under the SC ESEA/Federal Accountability System for the third year in a row.
- The students' SCPASS scores at Lake View Elementary exceeded the state average in English Language Arts (ELA), science and social studies.
- Gordon Elementary created a master schedule which allowed grade level teachers to meet weekly for common planning
- · Teachers at Gordon Elementary worked in teams to plan standards-based lessons and to create common assessments.
- Dillon Middle School increased the level of parental involvement by hosting three Parent Night meetings.
- Students at Dillon Middle School participated in various music activities which allowed them to excel in the arts. Twenty-one (21) seventh and eighth graders made Eastern District Band, nineteen (19) seventh and eighth graders made Region Honor Band and seven (7) students were called back for All State.

- Fourteen (14) eighth grade students at Dillon Middle School were identified as gifted and talented in the area of
- Dillon High School received an ESEA Grade of "B" and was recognized with "Reward" status under the Federal Accountability Rating System.
- Dillon High School maintained an Absolute Rating of "Average" on the 2014 Annual School Report Card.
- Lake View High School (Gr. 6-12) maintained an ESEA Grade of "B" on the 2014 School Report Card.
- · Lake View High School (Gr. 6-8) maintained an Absolute Rating of "Average" on the 2014 School Report Card.
- · Lake View High School (Gr. 9-12) earned an Absolute Rating of "Good" on the 2014 School Report Card.
- The Adult Education Consortium includes students from Dillon and Lake View. Diploma, GED, ESOL, basic and WorkKeys classes were offered to students during the 2013-2014 school year.
- · In collaboration with North Eastern Technical College (NETC) and the South Carolina Workforce Initiative, Adult Education Consortium offered WorkKeys testing on-line. As a result, students earned national WorkKeys certificates to assist them with employability.
- High school students from Dillon High School and Lake View High School had the opportunity to attend classes at the Dillon County Technology Center to gain knowledge and skills related to various career interests: culinary arts. construction, agriculture, marketing, automotive technology, manufacturing, and human/health services.
- Students enrolled in the Cosmetology II and the Health Science CNA Program at the Dillon County Technology Center had a 100% pass rate on their State Boards.
- · A new Nail Technology course was initiated at the Dillon County Technology Center in the spring of 2014.

2013-2014 High School Assessment Program

The High School Assessment Program (HSAP) met the requirement of the South Carolina Education Accountability Act (EAA) of 1998 that required each high school student that attends a public school in the state of South Carolina to pass an exit examination in order to receive a South Carolina high school diploma. The last administration of the HSAP was summer 2014.

Act 155 (H.3919) passed by the General Assembly and signed into law by Governor Nikki R. Haley on April 14, 2014, eliminates the requirement for students to take the High School Assessment Program (HSAP). Beginning with the graduating class of 2015, students are no longer required to meet the exit examination requirement to earn a South Carolina high school diploma.
